

## STRENGTH IN DEPTH

I haven't had the time to examine the field closely (perhaps tonight over a glass of something red) but it is clearly packed to the rafters with champions. It might easily be the strongest field ever assembled for a Senior event. With so much talent, where to go?

Having spent the early afternoon in a BeBRIDGE Editorial meeting that included Alain Levy, Philippe Cronier and Michel Bessis I opted for TURKEY vs FRANCE MARILL in Round 2.


West led the  $\heartsuit 3$  and East took the ace, returned the jack and then played a third heart. Having won with the king declarer ran the J and East won (ducking looks best, but should not defeat the contract) and switched to a spade. Declarer won with the king and was soon claiming nine tricks, +400.

 $2\diamondsuit$  – artificial game forcing.

West led the ♥3 and East put in the jack(!), which more or less forced declarer to win with the king. He continued with a diamond for the queen but East could win and play two rounds of hearts, giving the defenders five tricks and 10 IMPs.

South found the vital lead of a diamond and North won, declarer following with the four and switched to the  $\clubsuit 8$ . South won with the king and played a second diamond, declarer winning, crossing to the  $\spadesuit A$  and playing the  $\heartsuit 6$ . It was hard for North to duck, and when he played the ace declarer could ruff and thanks to the 3-3 club split he had the rest, +600.

If declarer had unblocked a diamond honour at trick one, he would have had an extra entry to dummy, enough to ruff out the  $\heartsuit$ A and be able to enjoy a trick with the king.



Once again South found the essential trump lead and here North returned a diamond, declarer, having

unblocked the ten, winning with dummy's nine and playing the  $\bigcirc$ 3. North withheld the ace and declarer ruffed, crossed to the  $\spadesuit$  A and... took the club finesse. That meant he was an entry short and restricted to ten tricks, a 12 IMP loss.

It looks so natural for North to win the diamond lead, but try making 11 tricks if he ducks!

North led the  $\clubsuit$ J and declarer won with dummy's king and returned the nine to North's ten. North switched to the  $\heartsuit$ 10 and declarer won with the ace and continued with the  $\clubsuit$ 6, North winning as South discarded a diamond, and exiting with the  $\heartsuit$ 9. Declarer won in dummy, cashed another heart, North throwing the  $\diamondsuit$ 9 and exited with the  $\spadesuit$ 2. If South goes up with the ten, cashes the  $\heartsuit$ J and exits with a spade declarer is doomed, but he played the four and the nine saw North win with the king. He tried the  $\spadesuit$ 5,but declarer put in dummy's jack and could cash out for nine tricks, +400.

Once South has pitched a diamond on the third club declarer can get home by exiting with a heart rather than a low spade. South wins and doubtless plays a diamond but declarer takes the ace and cashes two clubs, squeezing North. However, if South throws a spade instead, then this line no longer works as long as South plays a diamond when in with the  $\heartsuit$  J.

We are not finished with this deal yet. When North switches to the ○10 suppose declarer ducks? North plays another heart but declarer wins and plays the ♣6, North winning and exiting with a club (a low spade is the best shot, forcing declarer to guess to play


dummy's jack) but declarer cashes two tricks in that suit and then cashes dummy's hearts, squeezing North (declarer still has to read the ending).

Finally, and perhaps the key point, North should duck the \$9! That leaves declarer short of an entry to establish the clubs.

North led the  $\bigcirc$ 10 and declarer won with the ace and played a club to the king and a club, North winning with the jack and returning the  $\bigcirc$ 9. Declarer was in bad shape, but he won, cashed another heart and played the  $\spadesuit$ 2. When South followed with the four (hard to play the ten!) North won with the king and found the now essential play of returning a spade. Declarer won with dummy's jack but could only score two more tricks, -100 and 11 IMPs.

West led the  $\heartsuit 8$  for the ten, jack and queen and declarer played a the  $\diamondsuit 10$ , overtaking it with dummy's queen. East won and played a second heart, ducked to West's seven, and a third heart saw declarer win with the ace. He now cashed four diamonds and ran the  $\spadesuit Q$ , East winning, cashing two hearts and playing a club, two down, -100.

That was unlucky. The winning line is to cash the last diamond, and then play a club setting up a trick for the king.

East led the  $\heartsuit 5$  and when the ten held declarer played the  $\diamondsuit A$  followed by the queen and five, East winning and switching to a club. Declarer finished with ten tricks, +430 and 11 IMPs.

At half time the French team led 38-18, a great set of deals I'm sure you will agree. Although they only scored a single IMP over the remaining 10 deals they only gave up eight for a 39-26 win.

# STAND NOT UPON THE ORDER OF YOUR GOING, BUT GO AT ONCE

Classic dramas can give some useful clues for bridge players also... In this tournament we have the generation of players who can remember quotes from Macbeth.

One of the boards of Round 2 has shown how you can use it and win by losing:

At many tables North players decided to open those 14 nice looking HCPs with stron 1NT. This was what happened at both tables of the POLAND 2 PAJĄK versus LITHUANIA match.

Iwański with his collection of spots did not wait for the hangman's sword but made use of one of the system toys – he started immediately rescue operation with Garbage Stayman. Although North did not have 4 cards in a major, in practice East-West could not enter this bidding and North-South were allowed to play undoubled.

It was a rare case of vulnerable "no double, no trouble", 200 for East-West. Open room

Here Kowalski decided to pass 1NT and Andrzej Pawlak doubled for take out. Such a double usually promises 4 cards in a major, but as Mick Jagger sings "You can't always have what you want", but in this board East had what Pawlak needed. The last hand, Kowalski once again did not try to rescue, but it would not help much, as after such a start, East-West could penalize each 2 level contract.

Against 1NT doubled Tuszyński led  $\bigcirc$ 2 and defenders scored +800 (*Snowman* in Polish bridge dialect). 12 imps for POLAND 2 PAJĄK.

In one of the featured matches South passed the opening and tried to escape when West doubled 1NT (14-16 HCP this time) and East penalized it:

A heart was led and defenders scored +1600.

At replay North opened with  $1\diamondsuit$  and East-West played 3NT, down two.

There was also accident of the different kind at one of the tables in this board.

North opened 1NT and East passed after 43 seconds (measured so exactly in some way). South also passed and West re-opened with a double.

When the board was over, South, a long time friend and partner of East, asked him politely in a words in the sense of "Inthe future, if you want to make a tea during bidding, better ask your girlfriend..."

# FIRST ROSENBLUM CUP, FIRST GOLD FROM THE ALMANAC OF POLISH BRIDGE


In 1978 the Polish national team flew to the United States for the Open World Championships limited to two pairs due to budget constraints. Tournament started with the pairs championships, where Lebioda - Wilkosz finished fourth. Later the first World Open Teams – Rosenblum Cup started. Just before the start of this tournament, Łukasz Lebioda had to withdraw due to important personal reasons. As we know, it is impossible to play bridge with three people, so he was replaced by the President of Polish Bridge Union, Marian Frenkiel, who formed a partnership with Andrzej Wilkosz.

Despite the initial problem everything was going well and after a few adventurous days the Poles found themselves in the semifinal, where they faced very strong national team of France, led by Paul Chemla.

40 boards were played in three segments -13,13 and 14. After the first two, the favorites were leading by eighteen match points. Two board before the end the lead of France exceeded to 22 imps. But the match was not over yet however.

In the penultimate board, Michel Perron misguessed declaring the vulnerable game. At the other table declarer was Andrzej Macieszczak, one of the most talented Polish players ever, and for him guessing the layout of the opponents hands was a piece of cake.

Finally came the last board, with both vulnerable:

French "scientific style auction bridge" lost here against Polish practical aproach to the bidding.

In the open room, with more information about the declarer's hand (3 • was showing a fragment and values) available Frenkiel made the club lead, the only reasonable action in this situation. Wilkosz won with an ace and returned a spade, setting the contract.

Michel Lebel had no hints as to which black suit he should choose. So he led a shorter one  $- \spadesuit 3$ , and after a few seconds Połeć claimed the contract.

The final score of the match 95:93 for Poland caused great joy for Poles, but right next to them crying Paul Chemla was crying, cuddled up in the chest of Omar Sharif.

This is what bridge is like.

The great final against Brazil was a concert of our team's game. The current Olympic Champions, with the freshly crowned world pairs champions Marcello Branco and Gabino Cintra, played rather conservatively, inaccurately and slightly unlucky, simply speaking – poorly.

At the end of the match, a humorous event took place which showed that, it is difficult to play four-handed in such important and thus exhausting events.

In one of the last hands, Frenkiel and Wilkosz bid:

1♣ -2 $\heartsuit$  (natural, forcing)

2NT - 3NT

Wilkosz had a QJx in his hearts, but the 4333 hand and good stops in the other suits prompted him to bid 2NT. After the first lead, declarer quickly realized nine easy tricks, and then, tired from the hardships of the last days... fell asleep. Only after nearly twenty minutes, awakened by Chagas, who was irritated by the prolonged break, he immediately claimed the contract.

Branco and Cintra collected the same nine tricks for a heart game in the other room.

It was a first gold medal for Poland at the world bridge championships.
