


West led the \lozenge 7 and declarer took East's nine with the king, discarding the \clubsuit 2 from dummy. The \spadesuit K lost to the ace and East switched to the \heartsuit 3 for the ten, queen and ace. Declarer ran the \heartsuit 8 to West's nine, and the \clubsuit Q was covered by the king and ace and East returned the \clubsuit 8 which was allowed to run to dummy's ten, declarer soon claiming the rest, +430.

Not many players overcalled $1 \diamondsuit$ and it's interesting to note that where they no-one copied Zia's pass. The penalty from $1 \diamondsuit$ doubled would have been significant.

West led the $\heartsuit 4$ and when dummy's eight held declarer cashed the ace and played two more rounds of the suit, West winning with the queen and switching to the $\clubsuit Q$ for the king and ace. East returned the $\diamondsuit J$ and declarer won with the king, cashed the $\diamondsuit 10$ and played the $\spadesuit K$. When it held he cashed the $\diamondsuit A$ and played a second spade but East won and played the $\diamondsuit 10$ and declarer had to lose two more tricks, -50 and 10 IMPs.


South led the $\lozenge 3$ and North won with the jack and continued with the queen, declarer ruffing, drawing trumps and enjoying dummy's spades, +450.

North led the \lozenge A and continued with the jack, forcing dummy to ruff. Declarer took the top hearts pitching a diamond and North ruffed, cashed the \lozenge K and continued with the queen, South pitching the \clubsuit 4. Declarer ruffed and drew trumps, but North's \clubsuit A was the setting trick, +50 and a swing of 11 IMPs.

One could write a few pages about the best approach with the East hand, for instance would you prefer a two-suited overcall?

South led the ♠7 and North won with the ace and switched to the ♥J. Declarer won with the ace, crossed to dummy with a diamond and saw South pitch the ♣2. A diamond back to hand, South parting with the ♣3, saw declarer continue with the ♣4 for the queen and ace and declarer played three more rounds of diamonds before exiting with a club. South won with the king and returned a club, leaving declarer with two heart losers, -50.


If declarer had been able to diagnose the layout, having risen with the \heartsuit A he could have played five rounds of diamonds, which would have put intolerable pressure on South.

West led the \lozenge Q and declarer ruffed and played the \clubsuit 8, covered by the nine and ace and the appearance of East's king was a happy sight. A club for the king and ace saw West return the \lozenge J and declarer ruffed, cashed the \clubsuit Q and ruffed a club. Declarer played dummy's \heartsuit 9 and East took the ace

and exited with the \heartsuit 5. Declarer put up the king, cashed the \spadesuit Q and claimed – a club would take care of dummy's heart, +590 and 11 IMPs.



East led the \clubsuit 7 and when dummy's queen held declarer continued with a club to the ace, East ruffing and returning the \lozenge Q. Declarer took the ace and played a heart and East went up with the ace and played the \lozenge 3. Declarer ruffed West's king, played a spade to the jack, and then continued with three more rounds of the suit, +590 and another 9 IMPs.

15 pairs reached 4° , the critical decision at most tables being whether South should raise North's 2° to 3° .

USA 4 Lall led 45-11 after ten deals.

North led the $\clubsuit 3$ and South won with the ace as declarer discarded dummy's $\heartsuit 2$. The switch to the $\heartsuit 10$ saw North win with the queen and the $\diamondsuit 7$ went to the four, ten and queen. Declarer continued with two rounds of clubs and South won and went back to spades, declarer claiming the rest, +630 and 11 IMPs.

The match had ended as it began with a game swing to Scotland Blue, but they had only collected 4 IMPs of the other 18 deals, USA 4 Lall outscoring them 61-25.

1990 IBPA AWARD FOR THE HAND OF THE YEAR

FROM THE ALMANAC OF POLISH BRIDGE



The International Bridge Press Association (IBPA) is an organization, where bridge journalists from around the world exchange press articles, interesting boards, ideas, etc. In the times of the Internet fake news there is a lot of information that cannot be relied on, but IBPA Bulletin and its awards are carefully selected year by year and everybody can see the real merits of the best plays.

In 1990 IBPA awarded Polish player – Joanna Raczyńska – with SOLOMON AWARD FOR THE HAND OF THE YEAR.

The hand was played during European Mixt Teams Championships at the match vs team TERRANEO (here AUSTRIA):



The bidding was easy:

Marek Szymanowski (TSC POLAND 4 BOCHEŃ-SKI) after Stayman has bid directly to the slam, hoping for some good cards in the partner's hand.

Let's read the article of French journalist Guy Dupont:

West led the \lozenge *J* to South's Queen. Can you see how she made the contract?

She drew trumps and played the **&**K-A and the **&**J. Her first good move was to let this run, discarding a diamond.

Her continuation was really brilliant: she led a low diamond from dummy, away from the King! This is as beautiful as a Mazurka music: if East takes his Ace, that will be the last trick he gets, as well as his first – so it's all right for the declarer, and if he ducks, West will win the 10, but will be forced to lead hearts into the tenace, as he does not hold any cards or a different suit (he would have loved to hold the last club, but as we know, there are only 13 cards of each suit).

Thus, declarer was able to get rid of her last two losing diamonds and score 1430. Fantastic!

Editor's note: Raczynska did particularly well not to play the fourth club. Had she done so, West would have had a chance for a brilliancy by jettisoning the blocking \lozenge 10 in this trick. This leaves East with two winners in the suit.

It was the start of very impressive carreer for Joanna (who now returned to her maiden name Żochowska). She moved to France in mid-nineties where she started to play full time. After a few years she became one of the top French woman players and begun to play for the France national women team with the very impressive record: gold medals in World Women Teams Championships (Venice Cup) in 2011 and 2015, silver in women teams in World Bridge Games 2016, in European Women Teams Championships – gold medals in 2008 and 2010, silver in 2012 and 2016, bronze in 2014. We can also add to this list three medals of European mixed championships.


Those results advanced her to (actually) 24th place at World Bridge Federation women ranking list and 12th at European Bridge League women ranking.

POLISH CLUB TROUBLES

Polish Club gained significant popularity but as any other system with multi-meaning opening bids is exposed to serious problems when the opponents interfere.

We have a good example in round three:



Playing Polish Club East starts with 1♣ (balanced 12-14 HCP, natural 15+HCP, 5+♣ or 18+HCP, any distribution), and after South pass West responds 1♦ (diamond suit is too weak for invitational 3♦ what is the standard treatment in Polish Club), also artificial (0-6 HCP, any, 7-11 HCP, unbalanced without 4card major, 16+HCP balanced without 4card major). Now North bids 3♠ and East faces the first problem.

In practice there are two options – double and $4 \clubsuit$. Both have obvious flaws. Double strongly suggests four cards in hearts, while $4 \clubsuit$ – a longer suit.

After double West will bid 3NT and East should probably pass.

After $4\clubsuit$ West will bid $4\diamondsuit$ which promises "something" but in rather wide range – 6-10 HCP. Does East have enough now for cue bid $4\spadesuit$ ($4\heartsuit$ would be natural with 5+ suit)? If he decided for it, East-West should find the way to a slam.

Some pairs play transfer responses to $1 \clubsuit$, and after $1 \spadesuit -7 + \text{HCP}$, no majors – and jump to $3 \spadesuit$ – it would be easier; now East has easy $4 \spadesuit$ showing strong hand, spade shortness, and one or two minors.

Some time ago, playing Polish Club, I used quite different set of responses invented by Nick Gartaganis, where 2♥/♠ were invitational (9-11HCP) with club/diamond suit of any quality. Here it would work perfectly – after 2♠ response and 3♠ by North, East can cue bid with 4♠, or may be even directly ask for key cards with 4NT. Simply strong club with Precision-style responses:

1♣ -2♦ - game forsing, 8+HCP, 5++0 would work perfectly.

And in natural systems diamond suit is found immediately:

$$1 \clubsuit - pass - 1 \diamondsuit (4+\diamondsuit) - 3 \spadesuit$$
?

Opener can bid Splinter $4 \spadesuit$. How should West react after this, it is another problem.

Those were the problems after fourth hand preempt. We can imagine, how "entertaining" problems might run after direct (by second seat) preempt.

In brief:

The Tonči Radelja Memorial – ICL is the international online team championship established in 2004 by the late Tonči Radelja, a Croatian professor of mathematics who loved the Bridge and used it as a medium to become friends. So wrote Tonči several years ago:

"Think of this as a night in your local club: be friendly and enjoy meeting old/new friends at the table".

Thereby, being friendly to our partner and to opponents is the first and most important victory we can get.

For the registration it suffices to send:

- The name of the team. It must be the name of a town, no matter how small.
- The name of the captain (BBO's and real name), and his email.

In the last edition, Fall 2020, eighty-eight teams have played from twenty-nine countries in Europe and Africa.

There aren't limits to the number of players per team (but read the rules). The Captain will be responsible for his players and has to guarantee that all them have read the rules, especially the System Policy and the Anti-cheating policy paragraphs.
