

North led the  $\clubsuit 8$  and declarer took the second round of the suit and ran the  $\clubsuit Q$ . When it held a club to the jack was followed by the  $\clubsuit A$  and the  $\diamondsuit 9$ . That resulted in 11 tricks, +460.



North led the  $\heartsuit$ K and declarer won, played a club to the jack, ran the  $\diamondsuit$ 9, played a diamond to the ace and cashed three more diamonds before exiting with

a heart. That meant he finished with ten tricks, +130, a loss of 8 IMPs.

If declarer cashes the last diamond North would have been forced to pitch a spade and then declarer can cash the spade ace, run the AQ and exit with a heart, forcing North to give the last trick to dummy's A10.




Declarer took the spade lead in hand, played a diamond to the queen, a club to the ace and forced out the  $\Diamond$  A, +690 but another 12 IMPs were lost.

That made the score 25-8, but some minor swings made the score going into the final deal 30-24.

Having cashed the  $\Diamond$  A declarer must unblock the

- $\bullet$  Q before playing a third diamond. Then he can get to dummy with the  $\clubsuit$  A and thanks to the fall of the
- ♠ J cash spades, discarding clubs, making 11 tricks.

It was a win for Belgium, 35-24, leaving them in sixth place.

North led the  $\clubsuit Q$  and having won perforce with the ace declarer played dummy's diamond for the four, jack and five. He cashed the  $\lozenge A$  and exited with the ten, South winning, cashing the  $\heartsuit KA$  and the  $\lozenge K$  before exiting with a heart. North cashed two tricks in the suit and exited with the  $\spadesuit 6$ . North had pitched a spade on the third round of diamonds so if declarer had guessed to win with dummy's king he would have been two down, but he won in hand with the queen and had to lose a club at the end, -300.

# SENIOR'S FIRST TIME FROM THE ALMANAC OF POLISH BRIDGE

In 2000, The World Teams Championships were held in Bermuda. It was the 50th anniversary of the first championships for Bermuda Bowl. The following three championships – Open Teams – Bermuda Bowl, Women Teams – Venice Cup and The Transnational Teams – received on addition that year – Orbis Senior Teams. Orbis (investment management company) was one of the major sponsors of the championships.


After open senior teams championships, played for the first time in Albuquerque 1994 (now Rand Cup), national seniors teams championships started (now named D'Orsi Trophy). Later seniors championships started to be held also during bridge Olympiads (now World Bridge Games), first time in Maastricht 2000.

6 teams competed at that event, and the winner was POLAND with following players: Andrzej Wilkosz, Stefan Szenberg (in TSC – POLAND 3 SZENBERG), Aleksander Jezioro, Julian Klukowski and Janusz Nowak.

The final against France was completely dominated by the Polish team, which won 229-73 in 48 boards. (they won second of three segments 84-12 and the last 95-19).

Here are the two examples of Polish seniors power play from Bermuda.



After that, standard, bidding West led a club king, and when it was ducked, continued clubs with the queen (East discarded  $\heartsuit 4$  at that trick). Declarer won with the ace and played  $\clubsuit 10$  (heart from dummy,  $\diamondsuit 3$  from East). West won and switched to a diamond. East won with the jack and exited with a low heart, ducked to the jack in dummy.

Now declarer cashed ace and king of hearts, leaving following position:



Wilkosz now cashed two top spades – king and ace and played a ♣9 from the hand, discarding a diamond from dummy. Poor East disposed diamond queen, but the diamond was played in the next trick and two last tricks were won with the queen and 10 of spades, maybe not in that order.

The second board is from the final and its hero is the patron of CBF-PBU TRANSATLANTIC SENIORS CUP Julian Klukowski. He faced a bidding problem:

opponents vulnerable, you are not,


What is your choice for first hand opening bid with:

Julek decided to open  $5 \diamondsuit$ . It became the final contract.

South led  $\clubsuit 10$  and when the dummy appeared:

he was not probably too happy with this decision, but when North won with the ace and returned a club, South has ruffed and it surely calmed Julek.

This is the whole board:



In the othe room, the opening was  $1 \diamondsuit$  and bidding went highly competitive:

# TALE OF THE UNLUCKY EXPERT

Marek Wójcicki

Playing an important match, second hand, green vs. red I got:

# **♦** - ♥ 7654 ♦ AKJ763 **♣** 863

My RHO has passed. We play standard preempts, even in these vulnerabilities  $3 \diamondsuit$  opening promises a good suit, so my hand qualifies to  $3 \diamondsuit$ , but those 4 heart spots... What should I do?

Although in my senior age, I remember almost all hands I have played in my life and I had this hand about 40 years ago.

First time I have opened 3 \( \times\) (who cares about 7654...) and I played it. Partner put in dummy nothing special:

# **♦** Q85 ♥ AKQ102 ♦ 98 **♣** A98

They led a club, I won with the ace, played diamonds from the top, queen was third on te left, and I made 4.

At the other table the opponent with my hand passed, his LHO opened  $2 \spadesuit$  (weak), partner overcalled  $3 \heartsuit$ . Luckily for us they stopped before grand slam (hearts were 2-2), limiting our loss to 13 imps.

So this time I decided to follow the bridge textbook and I have passed.


In a moment I have regretted it. The bidding went:

W	N	Е	S Me

My expert partner of course has led a spade and declarer quickly completed nine tricks.

600 for East/West.

This is the board 6 of round 10:



In the Grand Derby of former *Crown of the Kingdom of Poland and the Grand Duchy of Lithuania*, Włodek Starkowski has passed as South and Kowalski - Romański bid to 3NT. Michal Kwiecień naively led a spade, so with clubs 3-2 declarer claimed 9 tricks.

At the second table Bogusław Gierulski, also an expert, but the one who probably played this board for the first time, opened with  $3 \diamondsuit$ :

Marek Blat is well known in Poland as the unlucky partner, the cards he usually puts as a dummy are not the best declarer can expect, to put it mildly.

This time dummy was quite good, but it was not possible to overcome bad trump suit split and the contract went two down. Lithuania won here 13 imps, and the whole match 49-28 imps.
