

Going into the third session of their quarter-final, USA 2 Simson led USA 3 Levine 54-37.

North found the only lead to be sure of defeating the slam, the  $\heartsuit$ J. South won and returned the  $\clubsuit 4$  and declarer ruffed in dummy, ruffed a spade, ruffed a club, ruffed a spade, ruffed the  $\clubsuit$ A and ruffed another spade. He then cashed three hearts, but there was no squeeze, one down, -100 and a massive 17 IMP swing.

Say North had led a diamond?

Declarer takes South's jack with the king and cross

-ruffs clubs and spades before exiting with a trump. South wins, but cannot play a minor suit so must lead a spade which allows declarer to ruff, cross to dummy and ruff a fourth spade, establishing the ♠ K.


South led the  $\bigstar$  K and declarer won with dummy's ace and played the  $\bigstar$ Q, North taking the ace and switching to the  $\lozenge$ 9. Declarer went up with the ace, pitched a diamond on the  $\bigstar$ K, ruffed the  $\bigstar$ 9 and played three rounds of hearts ending in hand. After cashing the clubs a spade set up an eleventh trick, +650. Only the ,movie-star' lead of the  $\lozenge$ K will give a chance to defeat  $4 \heartsuit$ .

When declarer put up the ace South unblocked the king, won the club exit and played a diamond. North took two tricks in the suit and switched to the  $\spadesuit$ 6, ensuring one down, -100 and another 13 IMPs.



North led the  $\clubsuit$ A for the five, six and 8. When North switched to the  $\lozenge$ 9 declarer could win dummy's ace, cash the  $\heartsuit$ AQ pitching a club and play a spade to the queen, +620 and 12 badly needed IMPs.

USA 2 Simpson took the set 38-35 making the overall score 92-72 with 12 deals remaining.

Over the first four deals of the final session USA 2 Simpson added another 10 IMPs putting them 30 ahead with 8 to play.

Over the next three deals USA 3 Levine recovered 6 IMPs via an overtrick and a partscore.

North led the  $\clubsuit 5$  and declarer won with dummy's ace, played a diamond to the ace and ruffed a diamond. A spade to the king saw South pitch the  $\lozenge Q$  and declarer continued with the  $\image K$  and a heart, North taking the ace and exiting with a diamond. Declarer won and exited with the  $\clubsuit K$  but North won, cashed the queen and waited for his trump trick, -50.

If declarer had tried exiting with two rounds of spades, dummy would have been squeezed. Once declarer pitches a club North can play the ace followed by the queen and South's nine will be the setting trick. If declarer cashes the  $\Diamond K$  before playing the second heart he removes North's exit card.



I recall doing the same thing myself in four-board play-off in the Spring Fours against Forrester and Smolski - it let 6♣ make because I had found the lead that set up a ruff for partner but then ducked a round of trumps holding the ace.



He exited with a diamond and North won with the ten and switched to the  $\clubsuit$ 5, South winning with the king and returning the seven for the queen and ace. That meant declarer was three down, -500.





West led the  $\bigcirc$ 3 and East won with the king and switched to the  $\bigcirc$ Q. Declarer won with the ace, cashed the  $\clubsuit$ A and played a spade to the jack. The good news was that it held, the bad that East discarded the  $\clubsuit$ 6. Declarer continued with dummy's  $\bigcirc$ 4 and when East followed with the seven declarer put up the queen. He cashed the king and jack of diamonds to reach this ending:



If declarer now exits with a low club, West wins and must exit with a diamond. Declarer wins and can now play a heart. East wins and can cash another heart but must then lead into the split club tenace. Even if West was able to win the heart exit with the jack, declarer could afford to pitch a spade, always score two more tricks.

However, it was much more likely that West held a singleton ♣Q and declarer cashed another diamond and then exited with the ♣K, the winning line if you reverse the location of the ace and queen of clubs. West won, cashed a diamond and played a heart for two down, -200 and 8 IMPs that increased the winning margin to 15 IMPs.

What a match!

#### 2018 – WOMEN IN GOLD

#### FROM THE ALMANAC OF POLISH BRIDGE

European women's bridge arena for a long time had been dominated by France and England. More recently there were years when Austria, Italy, Denmark, Netherlands had their time. From some years now new countries have arrived there – Sweden and Poland. Polish women qualified for the first time in the history to Venice Cup in 2010, and they started to win medals in 2012 in World Bridge Games. In 2018 they won their first gold medal in national teams competitions – European Teams Championships in Ostend, Belgium.

The team consisted of the players who started their bridge carriers not so long time ago and we hope to enjoy their achievements in the future.

The Polish national team which played in Belgium had the following players on their roster: Cathy Bałdysz - Zofia Bałdysz (probably the only mother/daughter partnership with European title), Katarzyna Dufrat - Justyna Żmuda and Danuta Kazmucha - Anna Sarniak, npc Mirek Cichocki:


During the European Team Championships Women's series, in the Poland-Italy match, Justyna Zmuda was sitting East with:


After a 15-17 notrump and transfer, Zmuda led the diamond ace. This is what she saw (hands rotated):



On the diamond ace, the nine (upside-down signals) appeared from partner and the two from declarer. What next?

Except for diamond honours, the partner can have a jack at most. Thus, there is no hope for a trick in clubs. The only chance was in trumps. Żmuda found the only defence to defeat four hearts.

Justyna cashed the spade ace (Dufrat followed with the four, upside-down signals) and continued with another spade (eight from Dufrat). When declarer took the second spade in hand with the jack and played the ace of trumps and another, Zmuda won with her king and played one more spade, promoting a trick for the trump jack and setting the contract.



It was the only table in the Women's series where the contract was set. In the Open and Senior series, the four-heart contract was set only a few times. One of the defenders who also solved that problem was Michał Kwiecień (here in TSC POLAND MARKO-WICZ) in Senior Series.

#### For the registration it suffices to send:

- The name of the team. It must be the name of a town, no matter how small.
- The name of the captain (BBO's and real name), and his email.

In the last edition, Fall 2020, eighty-eight teams have played from twenty-nine countries in Europe and Africa.

There aren't limits to the number of players per team (but read the rules). The Captain will be responsible for his players and has to guarantee that all them have read the rules, especially the System Policy and the Anti-cheating policy paragraphs.

How to get to the Bridge Festival venue: Conventum Arena (Fabriksgatan 28) is situated in the middle of the city, just 200 meters from the Örebro Södra train station, and straight across the street from Scandic Grand Hotel.
